Wh- questions

We can use **wh-** questions to ask for information. **Wh-** questions use question words that include **w** and **h**. We use different question words to ask about different information:

- **What** - to ask for information about something
- **Where** - to ask about places
- **Who** - to ask about a person

Form **wh-** questions with a question word + **do/does** + subject + infinitive without **to**.

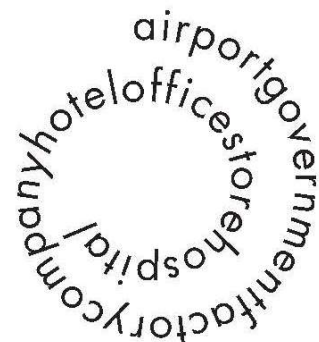

Grammar

Present Simple tense: habits or routines

We can use the **present simple tense** to talk about habits or routines. Form the present simple positive with the bare infinitive. In the third person singular add **-s** and add **-es** for verbs ending in **-ch, -sh, -s, -ss, -z, -o** and **-x**, and **-y** (-y changes to -i).

Form the negative with **do/does + not + bare infinitive**.

Contractions are common: **don't (= do not)** and **doesn't (= does not)**.
